

What the Cal Grant Program Means to California's College Students

The Cal Grant Program

- Helped almost 220,000 low- and middle-income Californians afford college in 2009-10
- Provides financial assistance to students who need help paying for tuition, books, and other expenses
- Cal Grant eligibility is based on students' family income and their grades
- Recent high school graduates who meet income and GPA criteria are guaranteed an award
- Other students – typically those who delayed going to college after high school – can apply for a very limited number of “competitive” awards. For the 2010-11 year, there were 13 eligible applicants for each available competitive grant.

Cal Grants Help Students Succeed

A 2004 study found that students who received Cal Grants were more likely to stay enrolled than students who did not receive a grant, even after controlling for family income and academic preparation. Community college students who received Cal Grants were more likely to transfer than those who did not receive grants.¹

Cal Grants Reduce Students' Need to Borrow

Fewer bachelor's degree recipients graduate with student loan debt in California than in most other states, and those who do take out loans borrow less. Of students graduating with BAs in 2009, 48 percent had taken out an average of \$17,326 in student loans, making California 43rd in the nation in the share of graduates borrowing and 44th in the amount borrowed.²
